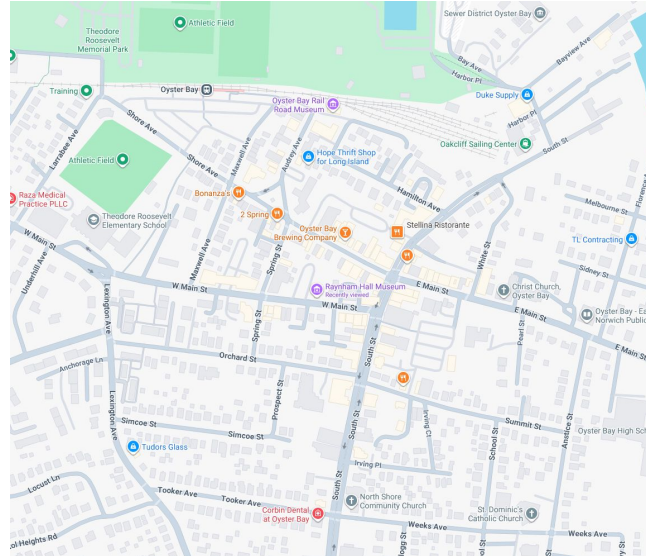

Brief History

During the American Revolution, Patriot merchant Samuel Townsend purchased Raynham Hall in Oyster Bay, New York, which had been constructed in 1738. The house was occupied by British officers, notably Major John André, involved in Benedict Arnold's treason conspiracy. The house was a major location for Revolutionary espionage since Townsend's son Robert and daughter Sally were members of the Culper Spy Ring. The home was renovated in Victorian Gothic Revival style by Solomon Townsend II in 1851 and given the name "Raynham Hall." It is now a museum that displays its Victorian and Colonial history.

1. Home of a Revolutionary Spy Family

Robert Townsend, who lived there, was a key member of George Washington's Culper Spy Ring, which gathered intelligence against the British during the American Revolution.

2. America's First Valentine

Sally Townsend, Robert's sister, is said to have received the first recorded Valentine in America from British officer Major John André while he was quartered in the house.

3. Two Eras Under One Roof

Raynham Hall uniquely combines Colonial (1738) and Victorian (1851) architecture after Solomon Townsend II remodeled the original home a century later.
