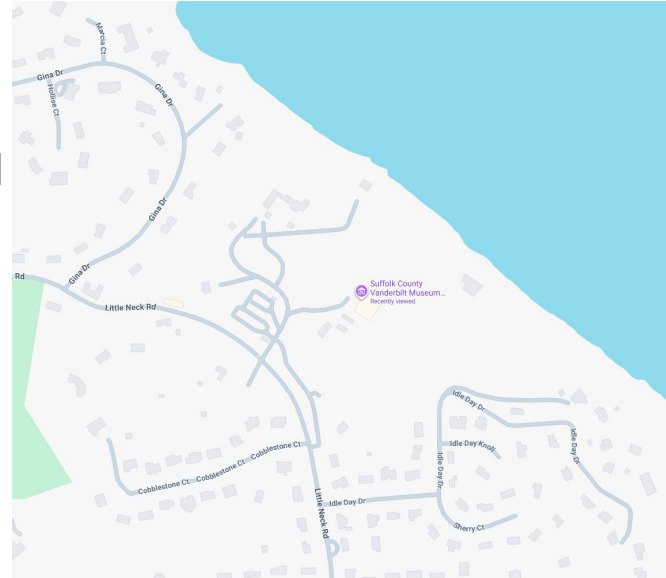

Brief History

The Vanderbilt Museum which is sometimes called the Eagle's Nest, was a summer home owned by William K. Vanderbilt, it was built between 1910 and 1936 looking out over the Northport Bay in Centerport, Long Island. The firm Warren & Wetmore designed the Spanish Revival estate which includes a mansion, marine museum, and planetarium. The property was then donated to Suffolk County to serve as a public museum and educational center after the death of William K. Vanderbilt.

1. Unique Collections

William K. Vanderbilt II was a world traveler and marine enthusiast who collected thousands of marine specimens, animal trophies, and cultural artifacts from his global expeditions — many of which are still displayed in the museum today.

2. Spanish Revival Architecture

The estate, known as *Eagle's Nest*, showcases Mediterranean and Spanish Revival design, complete with red-tiled roofs, courtyards, and ornate ironwork, giving it the look of a Spanish seaside villa.

3. Planetarium Addition

The museum grounds include the Charles and Helen Reichert Planetarium, added in 1971, which hosts astronomy shows, laser light displays, and educational programs.
